# Included in the Final FY 24-FY 25 Budget

## **Early Childhood Investments:**

- \$30 million for child care infrastructure grants to increase infant and toddler child care capacity in communities with high infant mortality rates.
- \$124 million for preschool, a strong commitment led by the Governor and bolstered by the House that will serve more than 11,525 additional children.
- \$101.5 million to support Help Me Grow home visiting
- \$32 million to support infant vitality efforts.
- \$46.8 million to support Early Intervention
- \$15 million to support lead abatement and safety
- \$16 million to support Dolly Parton's Imagination Library of Ohio
- \$7 million to support Early Childhood Mental Health
- \$499 million to support Children's Services
- \$2.5 million to support the Ohio Fatherhood Commission
- \$8 million to support the Benefit Bridge Employer Pilot Program, a two-year pilot program that provides grants to eligible employers to provide incentives to employees who are on certain public assistance programs.

## **Early Childhood Policy:**

- Creation of the new Department of Children and Youth
- An increase in the state's publicly funded child care program from 142% to 145%.
- Continuous Medicaid coverage for babies and toddlers, birth through age three, keeping Ohio's youngest Medicaid-eligible children accessing consistent health care services.
- A path forward for Medicaid reimbursement of doula services so Medicaid-eligible pregnant women and their babies can benefit from this critical, non-clinical support.
- Improved paid parental leave for state employees by tripling the paid parental leave period.
- A damaging policy to prohibit the state from adopting rules that require an administrator or employee of a licensed child care center or family child care to hold or obtain a bachelor's, master's, or doctoral degree.
- A damaging policy to prohibit the ratings developed for Step Up to Quality to take into consideration whether an administrator or employee holds or obtains a bachelor's, master's, or doctoral degree.

## Early Childhood Veto:

• A <u>line-item veto</u> by Governor DeWine that preserves Ohio's quality child care system by preventing the exemption of most licensed, publicly funded child care programs from meeting Step Up to Quality rating requirements.

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- \$150 million of ARPA funds the Governor proposed to be designated to child care scholarships for critical occupations and direct service professionals
- Increased Medicaid Eligibility for pregnant women and babies to 300% FPL
- Creation of Medicaid coverage for children under the age of 19 adopted through private agencies with special health care needs
