We cannot secure a strong future for Ohio without prioritizing the needs of our youngest Ohioans and the families who care for them.

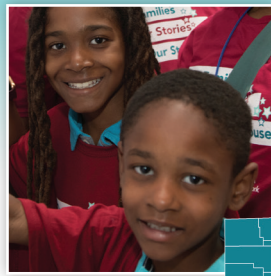
While Ohio has made progress in fostering a policy landscape that supports children and their families, there is still significant room for improvement. On the heels of an unprecedented pandemic that has had far-reaching, negative impacts on the health and well-being of Ohio's children and their families, it is more critical now than ever to lay a strong foundation for our young children and their families.

Our budget priorities to improve early learning and health outcomes for young children and their families include:

- ✓ Increasing access to child care for working Ohioans with low incomes to support the healthy development of children and improve parental workforce participation.
- ✓ Investing in the actual cost of child care that supports a fairly compensated and competitive professional workforce.
- ✓ Building capacity for child care for infants and toddlers.
- ✓ Expanding access to and better connecting families with critical resources that improve the health of mothers and babies.
- ✓ Improving Medicaid coverage and quality to meet the unique needs of mothers and babies.
